It is a self-guided walk on the beach that anyone can join at any time between 10-1. She also stated the Onset Bay Center has opened up registration for the learn to sail program running from June 28th through August 20th. Onset Bay Center will also be starting the weekly rotation of free programs that include stand up paddle boarding, kayaking, and learning to shellfish.

Mr. Swenson encouraged the Board to give serious consideration to the topic of the future use of Decas School and to focus on developing and documenting a process that can work for all Town properties under the jurisdiction of the Board not just Decas School.

9. TOWN BUSINESS

a. COVID-19 update.

Mr. Sullivan stated that the Town is now in the yellow risk category. There have been eighteen confirmed cases with six probable. South Coast Hospital Group has been doing vaccinations at the Multi-Service Center and they will also be travelling to different areas of Wareham to provide vaccinations to residents who lack mobility. May $11^{\rm th}$ is the first day no deaths were reported from the virus.

b. Trash disposal update.

Refunds to residents have been submitted.

c. Continued discussion regarding Boys and Girls Club closure and alternatives.

All representatives provided proposals of the plans and goals for future use of the Boys & Girls Club involving many academic and recreational programs. (See attached)

Superintendent Dr. Kimberly Shaver-Hood also expressed the school's interest in providing some opportunities for students in the Onset area along with adult programs and possibly expanding to include preschool programs.

 Discussion and vote to authorize submittal of Statement of Interest to Massachusetts School Building Authority for Wareham Middle School roof replacement.

Present Before the Board: Dr. Kimberly Shaver-Hood-Superintendent of Wareham Schools.

Dr. Shaver-Hood stated that the Wareham Middle School roof is in need of replacement due to age and tears to the roof. The anticipated approximate cost is 1.5 million dollars.

Dr. Shaver-Hood explained that there are six boilers in the High School, two of which are working. The boilers are over 30 years old and beyond repair. Replacement parts cannot be found due to the age. The anticipated approximate cost is \$250,000.00.

Dear Selectmen,

Following, please find our initial proposal and plan for the Ethel B. Hammond School left vacant by the Boys and Girls Club of New Bedford. The Bridge Church, along with Community Youth Empowerment, The Wareham Tigers, and Onset Kidz Block have collaborated in creating a plan that will utilize the referenced property to its fullest potential, while engaging the community of Wareham and Onset.

Our plan includes the formation of the Hammond Community Youth and Education Center @ The Bridge, a non-profit LLC/Corporation that will manage, administer, organize, and schedule the programs and general use of the facility. This organization will have a separate mission from The Bridge Church, but will be managed and overseen by The Bridge Church and it's board of directors.

Initial programs will be provided by Onset Kidz Block, Community Youth Empowerment, and the Wareham Tigers. Additional programs will be added as the Community Center is established. It is yet to be determined whether Onset Kidz Block, a Boys and Girls Club style program, will be established as a separate entity or be a function of the Community Center itself.

The Hammond Community Youth and Education Center @ the Bridge would be willing to provide capital resources for building upgrades and remodeling. The terms for capital improvements and investment would be agreed upon and determined by future lease arrangements made with the Town of Wareham.

Our four organizations are honored to be a part of the conversation regarding the use of the Ethel B. Hammond facility. Our collective goal is to meet the needs of our youth and children, while giving our neighborhood something to be proud of. We are all committed to seeing this building utilized to it's fullest potential for the benefit community of Onset and the greater community of Wareham. We appreciate your consideration. If we can be of any other assistance toward that end, please do not hesitate to ask.



Participant Expectations

- We expect participants to be respectful, attentive and open-minded toward team members, peers and volunteers.
- This program is designed to be an interactive, judgment-free space where participants can safely speak their mind.
- Participants are expected to be present—without the use of cell phones or other distractions—to engage in conversation, challenge themselves, and transcend their comfort zones. For virtual workshops, participants are also expected to have their camera on.
- All participants and volunteers are expected to be above the influence of any drugs or alcohol.

Student Population

- CYE works directly with Wareham Middle and High School students. The ethnic diversity of these students include but is not limited to: Black/African American, Cape Verdean, Caucasian, American Indian, Alaskan Native, and Native Hawaiian or other Pacific Islander's.
- Workshops consist of 10-50 students depending on the topic of conversation.

Current Programs

• Career Readiness Initiative

 CYE holds twelve workshops on the premise of youth education in financial literacy, professionalism, career exploration, resume building and interview preparation. (See attached workshop calendar).

Youth Leadership Initiative

 CYE offers 3-5 student internships to encourage youth involvement in workshops and community service opportunities. These students work directly with team members to assist with planning and organization of workshops and events.

• Volunteer & Community Service Initiative

- CYE collaborates with local leaders and venues for community service events to uplift our community. Our organization offers volunteer opportunities to students, adults and children to help accomplish our mission. Below are some community service programs or events we hosted or participated in:

Why Donate to CYE?



<u>Mission Statement</u>: To provide and transform community-based services and programs for the families of Onset and Wareham.

Program Ideas

Hip Hop Dance: This program has been designed around a genuine love for the Hip Hop Culture and its evolution of movement; therefore, cultivating a more authentic experience. In these classes we will focus on acquiring skills such as: basic rhythm, muscle control, body isolation, footwork, coordination, and strength. Though this program is primarily—choreography based—we will also work through freestyle exercises to encourage and broaden the range of natural movement and channel self-expression.

Wareham History: To Embrace and respect the history and culture of our Wareham Community.

Gardening: To create opportunities for children to create/sustain gardens, discover fresh food, make healthier food choices, and become better nourished. Gardens offer dynamic, beautiful settings in which to integrate every discipline, including science, math, reading, environmental studies, nutrition, and health.

Photography: To provide an enjoyable experience in front/behind of the camera as well as, to advance the skills and increase the personal enrichment of photographers of all experience levels and ages.
