Not everybody will get CTE because of a concussion. Skills related to contact sports are very important and it is suggested for kids to hold off on contact sports until older when their brain is more developed to limit exposure Control of the state of the

## **Review of Student Discipline**

Mrs. Chandler, Principal Decas School, stated that all disciplinary incidents are teachable experiences. There were 214 incidents last year and 186 incidents this year to date. The School-wide Intervention and Supports (SWIS) program monitors discipline, i.e. where it

Mrs. Seamans, Principa, I and Mrs. Murphy, Assistant Principal, Minot reported that the discipline incidents have gone down in every category in the same period of time as last year except for yerbal threats./Mrs. Seamans reviewed the steps implemented at the school: and ways the administration features positive behavior with rewards.

In response to members' questions about a student's behavior being chronic and is this the wrong school for that student, children having more incidents than others are flagged for the the student support council, team meetings and/or provide other supports for those children. We don't let a student's behavior become chronic with the steps we have in place.

In response to students still in school after an assault of a staff member, Dr. Shaver-Hood stated that some students with behavior challenges have other issues going on in and out of school and it is the educators' job to look into this for a short-term or long-term placement. A collaboration with behavior support in place helps a student be successful.

Dr. Steedman, Principal Middle School, reported a decline in the total discipline referrals (Sept-March) this year to last year. We have great kids in the district who sometimes make poor choices. The decline in incidents is due to staff supporting the students and our initiatives to increase pro-social behavior including two pilot programs, the Academic Support Class and Morning Mentors. In the date of the control of t

In response to members' questions, the initial surveys done in October were positive and another survey will be done soon. Are the 25% or 5 students, not making progress in discipline having a negative impact on the school, Principal Steedman is always optimistic. Dr. Shaver-Hood stated that it is the students' right to attend classes in an environment where they can learn. It is our job to come up with a solution to channel students' behaviors not to interfere with the rights of others.

Scott Palladino, Principal WHS, presented two types of discipline incidents, attendance and disruptive. Each has gone down for the last two years. There are discipline improvements with the deans and other interventions and support staff in place.

The following concerns were expressed by members of the community, parents and staff. The Committee members, Superintendent, Business Manager, Town Administrator, and a member of the Board of Selectmen were available to answer questions.

- > Upcoming Kindergarten projected at 200 with portables at Decas School.
- Frade 4 students being bussed with high school students is a concern and looking at various bussing configurations. Grade 4 students to Middle School and ride the bus with other elementary students starting at the elementary time and a separate wing for grade 4 & 5, recess time in the various fields around the school, no playground available.
- Regarding discipline the district does have a long term program to track students through high school.
- Reduction of staff 19% to reduction of students 27%.
- > Can we negotiate back the raise for next year? Even with the increase our teachers are still underpaid; not in the best interest of the town!!!!!!
- > Unfair to parents, kids, and staff with these budget cuts. What kind of education are they going to have with 33 staff cuts? Class sizes and services will be maintained.
- My child is losing out because of discipline. How much is enough? Will be looking into school choice. If we close Minot now, you won't see a new school.
- ➤ Have been through changes in closing schools and merging of grade configuration and now another upheaval in our town. This is not the answer but is chasing more parents out of Wareham. Begging the Town Administrator to come up with a different way of handling this and not cut into the school budget.
- ➤ Costing Wareham \$3 million for choice and charter less net revenue. If we bring the \$3.1 million budget to town meeting, the Finance Committee has the right to amend that number. The other alternative is not close Minot which will result in laying off more teachers.
- > Did not hear anything about bullying under the discipline report. If we close Minot now, will not get the vote for a new school.
- The system is at state minimum and all we can do is cut. We need money to improve our system, so go out and vote.
- Concern with new housing project and if this was in the enrollment projections. Projections were made on increased enrollment. Need to ask parents who have taken kids out, why? Have heard from parents they are moving out because of discipline issues.
- ➤ Will some students have free transportation? Yes, student in K-6 outside 2 miles and free/reduced lunch students.
- The teaching schedule for Deans is half time and Department Chairs is less with evaluation duties.
- In regard to the town having a 5-year plan, this financial situation was predicted twenty years ago with proposition 2 ½. 66% of the town's revenue is given to the schools. We need new revenue streams and need to have people vote for an override. We do have an educational strategic plan. The physical plan is town meeting voting for a new school with 75% state reimbursement. The town wants Decas School space for a new tax revenue.
- How are parents going to have confidence in the school system with our leaders looking to get out.

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- > Son has had a great experience. We have the best teachers and principal and school committee because they work with what they have.
- > Has seen too many schools closed and if Minot closes, not going to get funding. Does not want 4th graders going to middle school and will look into charter school.
- Home schooling child because of problems heard about, including bullying. The budget is the problem and what is wrong with this town to vote this down.
- Disappointed with override not passing. Is there any way to get money elsewhere instead of cutting the budget. Grants have seen reductions and the Town Administrator is seeking other sources, but we need to increase the tax rate.

Current student capacity K-4 is close to capacity of new building but state formula gives the proposed new school capacity to grow.

- > Staff cuts are coming in every area and some through retirements. Positions will be lost but we will continue to meet IEP's and contractual obligations for teacher prep.
- Why not increase business taxes. Because the levy increase can only increase 21/2% - 80% residential, 20% commercial. We need help to get affordable housing for mobile homes bill through.
- Urged audience to go to town meeting to listen and learn.

Every year parents sign an agreement for rules; must make parents accountable for what children do in school. Why are we not enforcing the handbook?

- > Is discipline costing us more money than it should? Yes, some students are sent out of district and it takes staff and resources to deal with issues. Some students come to school with trauma issues and it takes both resources and time.
- Understand parents concerns of 4th graders and discipline is one of the reasons why parents leave our district. PTA and School Councils make parents part of the school culture. It's a social media frenzy instead of working within the district. Email your School Committee members.
- Preschool enrollment fluctuates from 70 to 100 as students come into the program by age level, peers models and students with special needs. We can team with high school students for a child development class. We are aware of issues which need to be addressed i.e., plumbing, play area, appropriate size furniture. Looking at Middle school also. The community needs to come together and thank teachers when you see them.
- We need to bring our community back to the Wareham Public Schools.
