HEARING AT APPROXIMATELY 7:15 P.M. – Application from AJ C Store, Inc. d/b/a New England Convenience, Kelly Jolin, Manager, 3088 Cranberry Hwy, East Wareham, MA has applied to the Board of Selectmen for an Annual Package Goods Store Wine & Malt Only Beverage License under the provisions of Chapter 138 of the Massachusetts General Laws for the year 2022.

Present before the Board: Amine Nassif, Owner; Jillian Morton, Attorney

Ms. Morton stated that Mr. Nassif started a smoke shop at 3088 Cranberry Hwy and due to the regulation changes he decided to change the shop to a convenience store. He is seeking approval for a wine and malt license to expand his business. The Board questioned the lease documents provided and the proof of insurance. Selectman Slavin recommended continuing the hearing subject to receiving the full lease agreement and proof of liquor liability.

**MOTION:** Selectman Slavin moved to continue the hearing on November 15, 2022 subject to receiving proof of liquor liability insurance and reviewing the full lease. Selectman Besse seconded. a. Vote to Authorize Veterans Day Proclamation.

b. Discussion and possible vote regarding BOS policy No. 13-04. Stabilization and OPEB Trust Fund policy.

Mr. Sullivan requested the following changes to the Stabilization and OPED Trust Fund Policy:

- 1. "At least" \$100,000.00 should be transferred from free cash to the Stabilization Fund to maintain reserves at "a minimum" of 5% of the current fiscal year's operating budget.
- 2. "At least \$300,000.00 should be" transferred to the OPEB trust fund.

**MOTION:** Selectman Wurts moved to approve the amendment to BOS policy No. 13-04 Stabilization and OPEB Trust Fund Policy as presented by Mr. Sullivan. Selectman Chadwick seconded. Roll Call: Selectman Slavin-yes, Selectman Besse-yes, Selectman Chadwick-yes, Selectman Wurts-yes, Selectman Whiteside-yes.

VOTE: 5-0-0 (Unanimous)

c. Any other Town business not reasonably anticipated 48 hours prior to the posting of this meeting.

#### 8. TOWN ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

Mr. Sullivan stated that the auction was successful. The East Wareham School sold for \$500,000.00, the West Wareham School sold for \$400,000.00 and 56 Carver Road which abuts the West Wareham School sold for \$160,000.00.

There were numerous compliments regarding the Trick or Treating event on Main Street by merchants and residents. Compliments were also given to the Wareham Police Department, Wareham Fire Department and the Onset Fire Department.

Registration for the Remembrance Trees has started. There will be 74 trees, the cost will be \$50.00 and the net proceeds will go to Damien's Pantry. In addition, there will be 60 trees in available in honor of veterans and the net proceeds will go to the Kendrick House. ### MOMENT OF SILENCE FOR PATRICIA CULLEN WHO PASSED AWAY OCTOBER 24th

Pat Cullen was an active and well-loved member of our Town, known mostly for teaching so many of our children.

She first started teaching in Northborough as a physical education teacher for nine years but eventually changed to the classroom and taught at the Decas Elementary School in grades 2-6. When the 6<sup>th</sup> grade moved to the Middle School, which was her favorite grade, she moved with it and finished her career there until she retired in 2001. She taught for a total of 33 years.

One of her co-workers at the Middle School said it best: "She loved her students, and they loved her. Pat didn't just teach the core academics. She taught her students tolerance, patience, fairness, honesty, and self-respect. She always looked for the positives in her students, and she made sure each and every one of them knew that they were special in some way." Pat was also highly respected by her colleagues and the many teachers, and student teachers she helped along the way.

Because of her tenure in our education system, and her love of sports, the gymnasium at the Middle School was named in her honor in a ceremony in 2009.

Many might not know that Pat was a founding member of the Friends of the Wareham Free Library. When the Library was in the original Tobey Library Building on High Street, Pat convinced a group of mothers who regularly brought their children to the library that they should organize into a Friends group. She served as the President of the Friends, was a Lifetime member, and also served as a Library Trustee.

She was a member of the Church of the Good Shepherd and served for several years on the altar guild and as the publicity chairman for the church.

Pat loved her family, her daughter and son, and her grandchildren. She was thrilled to welcome her first granddaughter, and sadly passed away on the baby's first birthday. We would like to send our condolences to Pat's family and would ask for a moment of silence for this incredible woman and citizen of Wareham.

Craig Schluter was the husband of Pam Schluter, a much loved second grade teacher in Wareham

Mr. Schluter worked for Air New England and New England Telephone and Telegraph. He was also a foreman for A.D. Makepeace, where he worked for 23 years, and a driver for P.A. Landers. He also served as Lieutenant on brush breakers for the Town of Wareham at the White Island Fire Station, and was one of the first EMTs for the town. Mr. Schluter was a Vietnam era veteran and served in the U.S. Marine Corps from 1968 to 1972.

He enjoyed riding his motorcycle and was a member of the Harley Owners Group (H.O.G.) of Cape Cod. Mr. Schluter also served on the Wareham Veterans Council and the Marine Resources Commission. He was a member of the North Shore Clam Diggers Group and enjoyed travelling and camping in Myrtle Beach, SC.

Survivors include his wife, Pamela; a retired second grade teacher.

### VETERANS DAY PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS: The 11th of November 1918 marked the end of WW I, and was commemorated starting in 1919 with the celebration known as Armistice Day;

WHEREAS: In 1954 Armistice Day was officially renamed Veterans Day in recognition of the intervening wars and conflicts fought valiantly by American Veterans, men and women, on foreign soils, on the sea, and in the air to preserve our heritage of Freedom;

WHEREAS: The Freedom we enjoy as Americans does not come without a price. Our Nation's Veterans have sacrificed to preserve and protect our country and our Constitution from all enemies, foreign and domestic, with the hope for peace not only on the battlefields, but also around the globe.

WHEREAS: Our Nation's Veterans have given willingly and unselfishly of themselves, some giving their lives, serving with distinction in the defense of the Democratic Principles of this great Nation, in the most demanding of circumstances, in the most dangerous corners of the Earth;

WHEREAS: As we pay tribute to our Veterans, we are ever mindful that neither speech, nor ceremony, neither parade nor monument, can repay the debt owed those men and women who have worn the many uniforms throughout the generations to safeguard the Republic with integrity, dedication and distinction;

WHEREAS: We acknowledge that the cost of Freedom continues even after the guns fall silent. We acknowledge that many of our Veterans, scarred mentally and physically, returned from war unheralded, without a grateful Nation's thanks. We acknowledge that our debt to our Veterans does not end the day their uniform is retired. Nor should our gratitude be expressed only one day a year;

WHEREAS: The greatest acknowledgement of our Freedom is to honor our Armed Forces Veterans who have sacrificed for that Freedom;

**NOW THEREFORE:** We, the Board of Selectmen, do proclaim November 11, 2022 as Veterans Day, and we call upon all citizens to observe a moment of silence on November 11, 2022, at 11 AM, in remembrance of all our Veterans who fought to safeguard our heritage. Let us proudly and with dignity display the Flag of The United States of America throughout our Town of Wareham to honor our Veterans, and humbly give thanks. Let us reconsecrate ourselves to the task of promoting enduring peace, so that our Veteran's efforts shall not have been in vain.
